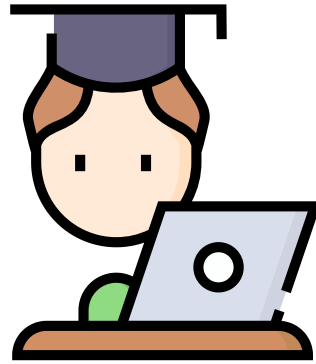
9. Integrate Cultural Learning:

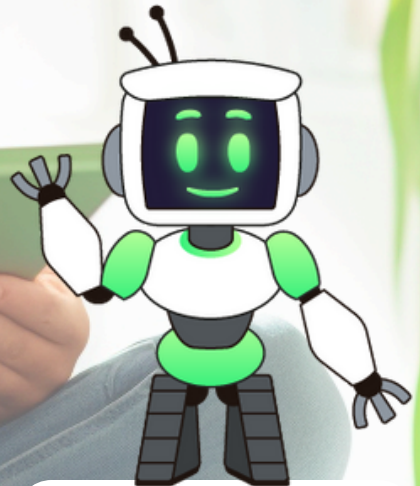
